Sacraments embody love and grace that are bigger than we can imagine in ways that we can practice and share. None are required to receive God's love or be claimed by our Church, yet all sacraments hope to each us something about God and ourselves.

From Joshua's Stones to Ours

Each week in worship, we provide time for people to reflect on God's presence in their life, including the symbols of rocks and paper cranes. The cranes are a newer symbol, drawing on the hope of a young girl in Japan who made the legend of 1,000 paper cranes come to life for generations to come. The stones have a much older meaning. We remember the story from Joshua as well as our Jewish ancestors placing stones as acts of remembrance. We remember Jesus saying the rocks would shout out loud if God's people remained silent, and the stone rolled away from Jesus tomb. The rocks provide a solid reminder of God's presence when our hearts are heavy or troubled. Placing either on our alter is an outward sign of inward emotions.
